ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION NEWS

1. HOLY TRINITY RIVER WARRIORS (HTRW)

Following on from the groups tidy up along their adopted stretch of the Ballinderry River (beside the Glenavon Hotel in Cookstown), when the group helped the Ballinderry River Enhancement Association (BREA), WWF NI, Tidy NI and the NIEA, lift litter from the banks of the river, erect bird and bat boxes, they were asked by Cookstown District Council to help tidy up some of the streets near the college. The group were helped by a couple of members of the council's environmental health department and teachers from the college. In the space of an hour they collected several bags of litter, thus highlighting the fact that litter is such a problem in urban areas too.

Just prior to this tidy up the group were presented with new hoodies, which have their new logo on. The hoodies were sponsored by the Glenavon Hotel. They were presented to the group by Brian Morris Jnr, (the hotels owner), and Mark Horton from the BREA. We would like to thank the Glenavon Hotel for their support.

The group also visited the Ballinderry Fish Hatchery BFH. This visit allowed the pupils to see, first hand, the essential and excellent work that the hatchery do in protecting, conserving and helping different species of animals to survive in the Ballinderry River and beyond. It also helped the pupils realise how important their own efforts, i.e. tidy – ups, erecting bird and bat boxes, are in helping the ecology of the Ballinderry River and the environment in general.

Two members of the HTRW, Shea O'Neill and Kathleen Fitzpatrick along with Mr Tennyson (Holy Trinity College Technology Department) helped erect a Barn Owl nest box. The nest box was erected within the area that the HTRW have adopted along the banks of the Ballinderry River. The nest box was given to the group by the RSPB. Holy Trinity College have been participating in the RSPBs Wildlife Action Awards this year. The school's Science Department would like to take this opportunity to thank the RSPB and especially Jen Banks who has held workshops at the school, which have included making bird feeders and minibeast corners.

The Holy Trinity River Warriors have recently returned to the area they have adopted to carry out another tidy-up. Thankfully this time there was not as much litter to collect.

These tidy - ups are made possible by the assistance of the BREAs C.U.R.E. (Clean up the River Environment) campaign. The HTRW would like to thank Mark Horton, Eamon Cullen, Frank Mitchell and all at the BFH for all their help and advice during this time. The warriors hope to help them in their work for many years to come and the Holy Trinity River Warriors intend to keep fighting for the environment for many years to come.

Copse Pack

The Copse Pack contains 30 native trees which are suitable for planting as a small wooded area or 'copse'. Your pack will be made up of: 10 of each - Birch, Rowan, Cherry.



All three species will add additional interest and colour and be of benefit to wildlife. The wild cherry will give you fantastic white blossom in the spring. The birch is dramatic throughout the year with its textured white bark and the vivid berries of the rowan will give you added interest in the autumn and are an excellent food source for birds.

Hedgerow Pack

The hedgerow pack contains 30 plants of the following species:

6 of each - Hawthorn, Hazel, Holly, Dog rose, Dogwood.

The trees can be planted as a traditional hedgerow and provide an excellent habitat for wildlife.

A mixture of species within a native hedgerow is an excellent habitat for small birds and mammals too.

4. TREE IDENTIFICATION – AT COLIN GLEN

The Colin Glen Trust is offering a series of plant identification courses throughout 2011. The first of these courses – Native Tree Identification – will help participants learn to identify a selection of trees using buds, bark and form.

Colin Glen Forest Park is an ideal location to learn a range of native trees. The park boasts 200 acres of native, deciduous woodland within easy access to Belfast and surrounding areas. Furthermore, forest park staff members are experienced in working with native species.

Speaking of the course, Lori Hartman, Environmental Education Coordinator at Colin Glen Trust said: "Colin Glen Forest Park has long been used for educational purposes, and I am so pleased to be adding plant identification courses to the list of offerings. The United Nations International Year of Forests was our original inspiration for the identification courses. What better way to get to know a forest than by learning about the plants that live there?"



Native tree identification will be the first of four identification courses throughout 2011. The first course will teach people to identify the native trees during the dormant season, when there are no leaves to rely on. In the spring and summer we will offer woodland flora identification, as the understory plants in a forest change from season to season. Finally, we will offer an extension of the native tree identification in September, looking at leaves." Speaking further of the course, Paul Bennett, Forest Park Ranger at Colin Glen Trust, said: "The native tree identification course is for anyone interested in trees or the outdoors, whether you are working in conservation or an enthusiast. Our identification courses will include lots of tips for recognising native plants. It is also a chance for professionals to get a refresher course."

Courses will be held at Colin Glen Forest Park, 163 Stewartstown Rd, Belfast, BT17 0HW. The cost per session is £10 per person. **Booking is essential**

6. STAND UP, HOP, PERCH, FLY...AND BE COUNTED!

RSPB sends out the call to take part in their summer garden wildlife survey, Make Your Nature Count. Your garden could be an oasis of wildlife. And you might not even realise until you spend an hour observing what's fluttering, buzzing about or nesting on your patch. Even compact urban gardens can be a miniature world teeming with fascinating colourful creatures. The RSPB wants to know all about it. Their big summer garden survey, Make Your Nature Count, is taking place June 4 – 12. "This is the follow-up to our hugely successful Big Garden Birdwatch in January; the world's biggest survey of its kind attracting over half a million participants", explains Stephanie Sim, RSPB NI.



Make Your Nature Count goes several steps further in that it's interested in all the animals visiting or resident in gardens and local parks, not just birds. So frogs, hedgehogs, bats, butterflies, squirrels, badgers, are all important parts of this count.

“Early June is the time of year when gardens are brimming with life. Especially bird life. Migrating birds have arrived, breeding and nesting is in full swing, there are insects galore. So it's a rewarding time to spend a relaxing hour watching the show, totting up how many of each species are seen and sending us the results,” Stephanie says.

“This year we especially want to know how garden wildlife has fared after two harsh winters in succession. These surveys have shown us that gardens are very important refuges for many animals.”

The survey will include a question about house martins. This species flies from Africa each spring to nest under the eaves of houses. Although still a common sight ducking and diving playfully on summer evenings, their numbers are in decline.

Make Your Nature Count is for everyone, city and country. “You'd be surprised that country gardens could well have less, if for instance, the city garden borders on a park or forest.”

Gardeners can help boost the wildlife community on their doorsteps by taking steps now to create a more nature friendly garden. Not only are gardens brimming with colourful blooms and beautiful shrubs more appealing; they are very attractive to birds and bees.

The RSPB website is full of easy, inexpensive ideas, including safe, effective alternatives to conventional pesticides, and putting out bird feeders. Stephanie advises, “Even into summer, it's important to help birds stay well-nourished as they are raising their young.” To take part in Make Your Nature Count, visit rspb.org.uk to find information and wildlife recording sheets to download. Complete the survey, and then submit the results online.

“Schools participation forms a huge part of the Big Garden Birdwatch and we're hoping many schools will get involved in Make Your Nature Count,” says Stephanie. “It's ideal for children. Kids get so much enjoyment and satisfaction out of these surveys, and it's the start of a lifelong interest in nature that could make a real difference to our future.”

3. TESCO CHARITY TRUST

The Tesco Charity Trust was set up in 1987 to support both national and local community charities. The Community Awards Scheme provides one-off donations of between £500 and £4,000 to local projects that support children and their education and welfare, elderly people and adults and children with disabilities. There are four rounds of funding each year.

The Tesco Charity Trust Trustees also consider grant applications at their tri-annual meetings. These grants range between £4,000 and £25,000 and are to support local, national or international projects. 4. GRANTS FROM THE TREE COUNCIL

The Tree Council's Tree Futures offers help for tree planting through two grants programmes, the 'Trees for Schools' and 'Community Trees' funds. Any school or community group within the UK that is planning a project that actively involves children under 16 is encouraged to draw on the fund to plant trees and make a greener future. The Tree

Council's [National Tree Week](#) (this year from 26 November to 4 December) is the focus for these projects and successful applicants organise their planting events in conjunction with our annual celebration of the new tree planting season.

We are able to fund projects between £100 and £700 and successful applicants will receive up to 75% towards their planting costs. For example, if your project totals £700, The Tree Council would offer up to £525. The remaining 25% will need to be secured by your school or organisation.

Applications for 2011 are now OPEN. Please see the Schools or Community pages to download an application form. With the generous support of an anonymous donor we have been able to produce a teaching and learning resource which will be sent out free of charge to all successful grant applicants.
